Our Vision is a restored and preserved John Hay Estate at The Fells on Lake Sunapee that:


- Draws people together to share interests in history, gardens, our natural setting, and the protection of the lake;

With these funds we will be able to transform these areas into welcoming and beautiful spaces that everyone can enjoy. Your investment will leave a lasting legacy for generations to come.


Our vision for the project... You drive through the new entry defined by two horseshoe boulder walls – a variation of the old entry stone pillars and curved walls. On each side there is a row of matching crab apples. The parking



By the Gatehouse, under the old oak tree, there are informal clusters of Rhododendrons that echo the plantings near the end of the drive to the Main House. The ground is carpeted in a mix of various flowers and plantings, including our beloved Bunchberry.

Beyond the Gatehouse you see that the old north parking area has been returned to a Fell. There are a few protruding outcrops of granite and a mown path through the wildflowers and native ground covers. You realize that the new entry now speaks to both the ecological theme of the Fells' natural areas, while also providing an appropriate taste of the horticultural heritage at the Main House.

We presented our plans to four contractors to get input and cost quotes. After many reviews and discussions, we decided to move forward with two contractors who have worked together in the past. One will implement the excavation and hardscape; the other will implement the plantings and design. Details are now being finalized and work is schedule for this spring once the snow clears and weather permits.

Main House Review

The Main House is a center for education here at the Hay Estate—it is a place where people from around the world come to visit and learn about this nationally significant historic property on Lake Sunapee.

Our Greeters and Docents play an integral role in educating, elevating and prioritizing our guests who visit the Main House. They serve as facilitators for learning here at the Main House, along with the contributions of our Landscape Staff. In addition to giving tours, our Docents help to mentor our Teen Docents, high school students who took advantage of a community service opportunity to delve into the history of this historic site and its family. We hope that through this experience they will be inspired to learn about the importance of the past, as well as to become aware of and appreciate the role of volunteerism in their community.

Achieving a period appearance in all of the rooms to the early 20th century, in a historic house that sees over 2,000 visitors a season, is not easy work. It has been a lively and exciting season, full of activity with many options to explore and discover here at the John Hay Estate.

Starting off in June, we held our annual 4th grade "Watershed Day" for students from local elementary schools. Students cycled through a series of outdoor activities designed to engage them

in hands-on learning about aquatic and terrestrial ecosystems.

These included student-centered simulations, nature journaling, small group investigations in Beech Brook, and playing games on the lawn. This program depends on the collaboration between the John Hay Estate and the Lake Sunapee Protective Association, as well as parent chaperones and classroom teachers.

Next, our Speaker Series provided opportunities to celebrate important days in our calendar. The Newbury Nature Explorers in the forest. Cut historical talk in April was



on "National Trains Day"; the talk about the Civil War and Lincoln's views on slavery was held on June 19th, "Juneteenth" (Emancipation Day); and the "Women of the Fells" talk was on the 175th anniversary of the first women's rights convention held in Seneca Falls, NY. We also welcomed Theodore Roosevelt and Edith in late August to remember the significant date of the President's visit in our Fells history. And on the next afternoon, forty people gathered in front of the Veranda to hear Eliot Cohen, a political scientist, author, historian, and former Counselor for the State Department. Cohen shared



his scholarship on the interplay between John Hay and Theodore Roosevelt in the

The Arts have also come to life this summer at the Hay Estate. We have the Poetry Walk, the outdoor sculpture exhibit, the 1st and 2nd floor art galleries for local artists, the Art in Bloom event with Lynn Merrill (what a treat, and so well done by our floral arrangers!), Artists Weekend, and Watercolor Camp for ages 10 and up. We have been able to accomplish so much this year to support the Arts! For our Artists Weekend on July 8-9, the rains and thunderstorms fortunately held off. We welcomed 17 participating artists and over 150 guests over both days of the event.

Fairy Festival, another of our favorite "big events," did not fare as well this year. We were forced to cancel due to the weather. We did hold a successful Hay Day on August 6, which drew many families and children to enjoy this unique summer festival experience at the Hay Estate. We are indebted to the many volunteers who helped to support Hay Day.

Lastly, a few words about our youth educational programming. Our Summer "Kids in Nature" Camps have now wrapped up – Watercolor Camp, Nature Photography, and Nature Explorers Camp. Each one provides summer enrichment opportunities for young people from across New Hampshire. These camps are supported by the Wellborn Ecology Fund, which helps place-based education programs in the Upper Valley. We also just received approval notification for a grant from the NH Council on the Arts to support our Children's Arts Series, including five programs to be held here from August-October.


